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President Jeff Jack

Jeff Jack’s involvement with the Austin Neighborhoods Council began as the Zilker Neighborhood Associations (ZNA) representative to ANC in the late 1980’s. Jeff was subsequently elected to the presidency of ANC in 1997 and served for two years until 1999. During this time Jeff initiated the re-organization of ANC into 10 sectors which is still utilized today. Jeff also served as the ANC representative on the City committee charged to create the guidelines for Neighborhood Planning and worked to make the Smart growth zoning tools available to neighborhoods as an opt-in option of neighborhood planning. In 2000, Jeff became the aid to City Council member Beverly Griffith for several years dealing with such issues as the location of SH130, Mueller Redevelopment, Budget deliberations, and countless zoning cases

He has also served three terms as the ZNA president where he led the successful effort to limit the application of the Vertical Mixed Use ordinance to only appropriate tracks along South Lamar. As president of ZNA he was a leader in taking ZNA out of the neighborhood planning process when it became apparent that neighborhood planning had changed from a community driven process to a staff driven process. Jeff has served on the Board of Adjustment and Planning Commission for the city of Austin as well as numerous other city taskforces and community advisory groups such as the CodeNEXT CAG.

He was also appointed to the Austin Community College campus advisory committee for both the ACC facilities at South Austin and the Highland Mall campuses. Jeff is a founding member of the Save Town Lake, a non-profit focused on maintaining the lakefront protections of the Waterfront Overlay ordinance. Along with Bill Bunch, Jeff founded the

Better Austin Today Political Action Committee to support environmental and neighborhood friendly city council candidates.

Jeff is an Architect with over 40 years of professional experience with commercial, institutional and residential projects having completed projects in over 30 different jurisdictions including Anchorage Alaska, New York City, Denver Colorado, Miami Florida and the Bay area of California. In Texas, he has completed projects in Austin, Amarillo, Waco, Harlingen, Sweetwater, Bastrop, Elgin, Lockhart, Smithville, Round Rock and San Marcos.

Immediate Past President Mary Ingle

Mary Ingle, continues to live up to the Best Neighborhood Advocate 2013 awarded her by Austin Chronicle's Best of Austin, Critic's Choice! As president of ANC for the past 4 years, she has devoted a great deal of time managing the all aspects of ANC's activities. Her tenaciousness, perseverance, and patience with City processes, procedures, and public hearings, not to mention the press, has enabled her to participate successfully as a seasoned neighborhood advocate in stakeholder groups, public hearings and other meetings. Mary continues to lead the ANC's CodeNEXT subcommittee in evaluating and reporting on the CodeNEXT process, all while serving her neighborhood- North University Neighborhood, the Central Austin Neighborhood Planning Advisory Committee, and a volunteer group called Community Not Commodity.

Vice-President 1 Lottie A. Dailey (withdrawn nomination from slate)

Lottie A. Dailey has worked as a public servant for many years. Lottie's earlier work history includes City Planner (Raleigh, NC, Huntsville, AL, and Nashville, TN), Law Clerk, Educator and Community Activist.

Education: BS Sociology, MS Urban and Regional Planning, JD Law and most recent MS Theology. Community service work: Austin Municipal Civil Service Commissioner and Community Development Commissioner (serving on the housing committee of the CDC). Served two years as the President of the Blackland community, Served in Chaplain Services at Brackenridge University Hospital and served as an Advisory Board member for the Blackland Community Center.

Volunteer work includes Mission Possible, Conley Guerrero Senior Center, Capital Area Food Bank, the Pecan Springs Community Center, and Teacher for Spread the Harvest Gardening Program.

Community Interests: Community work, affordable housing, homeless issues, veteran Issues, affordable health-care for all, equal pay for equal work, workplace child-care, The Livable Wage Act, accessible transportation for the community, Green power /spreading the harvest, and better interpersonal relations between the sexes and races.

Currently: Working on Community issues as needed and desiring to be a better public servant who will be accessible to all and willing to listen and work for a better community.

Vice-President 1 Patricia King

Patricia is currently the President of Berdoll Farms/ Meadows HOA. She has worked tirelessly with the sector neighborhoods for the development of “infrastructure” in the far southeastern area. The infrastructure needs include: a grocery store, restaurants, recreational facilities, etc.

Patricia’s experience extends to monthly meetings with Council Member Garza’s office on issues regarding Del Valle neighborhoods. She was instrumental in getting Metro Bus service in the neighborhood. In conjunction with her interests in transportation, Pat is presently working with Capital Metro Traffic Mitigation Department for speed bump approval. In her spare time, she serves as Church Clerk with the Cottonwood Baptist Church.

Patricia has had an array membership positions- ABIA 2040 Master Plan Project Advisory Committee, Austin Neighborhoods Council Sector 10 Representative for 5 years, Citizen’s Advisory Group (CAG) District 2 Representative for CodeNEXT, Del Valle Community Coalition, Save Our City Austin (SOCA) Board Member, and on the Sustainable Foods Farm-share Program.

Vice-President 2 Linda Bailey

Linda is currently ANC VP2 and is responsible for membership. She actively communicates with the ANC members and encourages membership.

She participated in the Regional Fire merger between ESD4 and AFD and is involved with wild land fire protections. She is on the board of the Glenlake Neighborhood Association and writes the quarterly City Park Road Newsletter for her surrounding neighbors. She is actively involved in the CodeNEXT land development code implementation and supports Austin neighborhoods by participating in the Community Not Commodity non –profit organization.

Vice-President 3 Kevin Wier

Kevin has been an active member of North Shoal Creek Neighborhood Association (NSCNA) for 14 years. He has been the chair of the NSCNA development committee for

about 7 years and has been NSCNA's ANC representative for about 7 years. Kevin served 4 years as ANC's Sector 2 representative and the past year as ANC VP3. He has been part of the ANC Communications Committee over the past year. Kevin is a board member of Sustainable Neighborhoods which works to improve North Central Austin. He was an active participant in the Imagine Austin process from beginning to end and has worked with other neighbors and neighborhoods on various issues that impact neighborhood quality of life. Kevin served a year on the CodeNext Citizens Advisory Group (CAG), appointed by City Council Member for District 7, Leslie Pool.

Co-Secretary Justin Irving

Justin moved to Austin in 2002 to begin school at UT. He lived in several places around Austin before taking a job at the city and settling in Cherrywood in 2008. Justin joined his neighborhood association's steering committee a little over a year later after becoming involved with issues concerning the Cap Metro Rail Red Line. At that time, he also became involved with the neighborhood's sidewalk master plan and was made Cherrywood's representative to ANC and has been here at ANC ever since. Justin served on the Austin Area Comprehensive HIV Planning Council, which is an autonomous city board that addresses the HIV epidemic in our area for the six-year maximum term. For most those six years, he served on the board's executive committee and chaired several subcommittees which helped direct the annual allocation of 4.5 million federal dollars to services here in the Austin that address the HIV epidemic. For the last two years Justin has served as one of ANC's two co-secretaries. He would like to continue to assist ANC in this capacity or any other that may benefit Austin's neighborhoods.

The experiences that Justin had with these groups, especially ANC, have taught him a lot about the consequences of a city that feels like it's trying to outgrow its roots, and CodeNext appears to be accelerating that growth. Justin would like to see the roots catch up. And if our neighborhoods are the ground that keeps those roots, ANC is the water that keeps them wet and the bug repellent that keeps the pests off. So, give Justin a watering can and put him to work.

Co-Secretary Joyce Basciano

Joyce has a long history of volunteering her services in various capacities for various neighborhood associations (Bryker Woods Neighborhood Association, West Austin Neighborhood Group, MoPac Neighborhood Associations Coalition, Central West Austin Neighborhood Planning Area Contact Team). She has served on the City of Austin Urban

Forestry Board. Stakeholder groups she has participated in include: Envision Central Texas; Shoal Creek Greenways Action Plan; COA Neighborhood Traffic Calming Study; Imagine Austin; Austin Clean Water Program Stakeholders Group; Parking Benefits District Stakeholders Group, and Improve Austin Streams Coordinating Committee. Joyce continues to monitor the Land Development Code Revision (a.k.a. CodeNEXT) process. After serving as ANC VP 1, where she planned general meeting programs in conjunction with the Executive Committee, Joyce has enjoyed her service as ANC Co-Secretary and would like to continue in that role.

Joyce is a full-time volunteer and homemaker. There are no conflicts with her past careers, as a geologist and computer programmer.

Treasurer Sheryl Cheatham

Qualifications: Sheryl has held 2 positions with Austin Neighborhoods Council, Sector 3 Representative and Treasurer. As a Sector Representative, she provided the neighborhoods information to keep them informed of activities city wide affecting them and visited many of the active Neighborhood Associations in her Sector multiple times. As a Windsor Park Neighborhood Association member, Sheryl has served as the Vice-President, Neighborhood ANC Representative, backup for Treasurer, and has been on the audit committee for the last few years. She has also served on several committees and attended City Council and the Planning Commission meetings on behalf of Northeast Austin.

For the past 25 years Sheryl has served as an Accounting Manager/Controller for several small start-ups. Presently, she continues to serve as a part-time accountant for a small start-up along with volunteering as Treasurer/Volunteer Coordinator for Useful Wild Plants of Texas, Treasurer of Responsible Growth of Windsor Park Neighborhood Association, active in the Northeast Austin Business and Community Alliance (NEABACA), and a volunteer Kitchen Diva at Launch Pad Job Club.

Goals: To be a pro-active member of the ANC Executive Committee to ensure that our neighborhoods are heard during the CodeNext process. As treasurer Sheryl will continue to provide accurate monthly, quarterly, and yearly financial statements and budgets.

Co-Communications Coordinator Jesse Moore

Jesse has been the secretary of the Bouldin Creek Neighborhood Association since 2015, and prior to that had a multi-decade history of being conscripted by his parents to help with BCNA activities such as newsletter delivery and park clean-up. He has lived in the neighborhood for most of his life, with the exceptions being stints north of the river in Hyde Park and West Campus to attend UT for college and law school and three years in Dallas to

truly understand how great Austin is and pay-down some debt. Jesse has been growing increasingly concerned about the deteriorating quality of life in Austin for years and sees volunteering for BCNA and ANC as a good opportunity to help. His main concerns are preserving what's left of the environmental and cultural diversity of Austin neighborhoods. As a graduate of AISD and UT, public education is also very important to him. Jesse has enjoyed being Co-Communications Coordinator for ANC for the past year and would be honored to continue helping in that role.

Co-Communications Coordinator Mike Lavigne

Mike has lived in Austin since he moved here in 1994 to attend UT. He went from the dorm to rented apartments in West Campus and Riverside to duplexes off Far West and has owned his home in Crestview for 15 years. He lives with his wife and 8 years old daughter in their recently remodeled 1952 home and hopes to stay there as long as possible.

Professionally, Mike is a public and government relations consultant. His practice is primarily focused on Texas Legislative advocacy, but he does engage in city related work as well as having stakes in the hospitality industry. He spent the first part of his career working in both houses of the State Legislature and on campaigns for all levels of government. He serves as the Executive Director of the Texas Democratic Party for approximately 2 ½ years before going on his own, well over a decade ago.

He has advised clients of all stripes on communications and legislative strategies. He has worked for environmental organizations and developers at one time or another. He believes that his unique ability to work with and put together “odd bedfellows” has been an integral component of his success thus far.

Mike also serves on the executive boards of the Austin Creative Alliance, Save Our City Austin, and Community Not Commodity.

His goal is for further ANC involvement is to help navigate the waters of CodeNEXT. He believes that we aren't successful in altering what has been proposed that most other issues are moot.

Sector 1 Representative Brad Parsons

Brad has lived in Austin off and on since 1975. He attended Casis, Murchison, Johnston (graduated), ACC, UT, and graduated from St. Ed's in 1994 with a degree in Finance and Economics. His useful skills are strategy, research, writing, analysis and advocacy. Brad was away from Austin for a couple decades and toward the end of that time served on the Sierra Club Executive Committee and on the Board of Directors of a local community radio station

in the locale where he was at in Hawaii. When Brad returned to Austin in 2011 to live in Northwest Austin, where he grew up, he was shocked at the changes that he saw, especially with City of Austin governance.

Since then, Brad has been active in Austin volunteering in various campaigns, the 10-1 campaign, every local bond issue since then, and in recent years he has been monitoring zoning cases in the NW part of the City. Currently Brad serves on the Multimodal Community Advisory Committee tasked with vetting the City's Austin Strategic Mobility Plan (ASMP). He has kept up with CodeNEXT and is helping with the voter petition this Fall to try to put CodeNEXT on the ballot for next May.

Brad's goal is to be a part of getting Austin back onto a realistic, sustainable path of living that maintains respect for traditional single family home neighborhoods. As ANC Sector 1 Representative, he believes that his research, writing and advocacy skills will continue to be useful in dealing with neighborhood issues. Sector 1 is now holding monthly Sector meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of each month. Brad hopes to get the NW Sector of Austin more involved in ANC in the coming year.

Sector 2 Representative Chip Harris

Chip Harris became involved in neighborhood activities when he moved into the Crestview neighborhood in north central Austin in the early 80's. He served as the president of the Crestview Neighborhood Association for many years and currently serves as the newsletter editor. Realizing that his neighborhood wasn't an island, he worked to help generate interest and membership in adjoining neighborhoods. Chip later worked on the development of the Crestview Neighborhood plan and was an original member of the contact team, helping to write the bylaws. Currently, he serves as the facilitator of the Crestview Neighborhood Plan Contact Team.

Chip has worked to preserve funding for the local branch libraries, and eventually he served on the City's Library Commission as Chair. During his tenure, the city held two bond elections that funded the replacement of temporary rental library facilities with permanent city-owned facilities in addition to new neighborhood branches across the city. His guiding principal for libraries was that there be equality in services in all parts of the city.

As a neighborhood advocate, Chip worked with TXDot and the City to develop and implement solutions that involved the construction of a million dollar bridge that reduced cut through traffic by 75% and the restoration of safety for the affected street and the neighborhood in general.

Working to generate community in his area and reduce crime, Chip worked each year to encourage residents to have National Night Out block parties that resulted in 50 parties one

year with nearly every block in the neighborhood covered involving more than 1,000 residents.

Chip would like to maintain ANC's strong voice for neighborhoods and develop more communication between neighborhoods so they may benefit and learn from those struggles.

Sector 3 Representative Seth Fowler

Seth Fowler, the current President of the University Hills Neighborhood Plan Contact Team and a Past President of the University Hills Neighborhood Association has made substantial contributions to the needs of his Northeast community including appearing before the City Planning Commission and the Austin City Council on zoning matters affecting the University Hills Neighborhood Plan and FLUM and assisting with the security of the Northeast area through service as a Past Member of the Austin Police Department's Citizens on Patrol program.

Additionally, Seth has a longstanding history of active involvement in several Austin Independent School District Programs, serving as the Past Vice President and President of the former Pearce Middle School PTA (now Bertha Sadler Means Young Women Leadership Academy), Reagan High School and Winn Elementary School PTAs, mentoring students at Lamar and Burnet Middle Schools, and serving as President of the LBJ High School PTA. Seth's passion for teaching and working with students continues to the present time. Seth has also served AISD's broad based needs by his work on a past AISD Bond Committee and serving as an Area IV Representative for the AISD while presently serving as a member of an AISD Campus Advisory Council.

Seth's educational achievements include a BS degree in Education, Minor in History, University of Texas at Austin, Alternative Teacher Certification Program Huston-Tillotson University, Texas Teacher Certificate, and Texas Educator Certificate in Special Education.

Sector 4 Representative Paul Schumann

Paul Schumann has been a resident of Lost Creek, Travis County, Texas for 37 years, and a resident of Austin for 21 months. He is the president of the Lost Creek Civic Organization. Recent issues he has been involved in include Loop 360 Improvement Study, TxDOT billboards on Austin designated scenic roadways, CodeNEXT, ADUs, low cost housing, commercial development of the Marshall Tract, interim zoning of Lost Creek and wildfire defense.

He is a strong proponent of web 2.0 technologies (social media), collaboration, civic engagement and innovation. Before retiring 3 years ago, he had 54 years of business and

technology development experience – 30 years with IBM and 23 years with his own consulting company, Glocal Vantage.

Paul and his wife Barbara have been married for 59 years and have two sons who with their wives and 5 children live in Austin. He is a graduate of the University of Texas with BS and MA degrees in physics.

Sector 5 Representative David Conner

David moved to Austin in 1994 and has lived in Hyde Park since 2006 restoring the homes he has owned. He is a member of Preservation Austin and Preservation Texas and is Past Chair of the Hyde Park Historic Home Tours. Currently he is the owner and caretaker of the William T. and Valerie Mansbendel Williams House at 3820 Avenue G – City Historic Landmark (2011) and Texas State Landmark (2013). David assisted the sponsors of the Blue Bonnet Local Historic District with design standards and procedures.

David has been Chair of the Hyde Park Development Review Committee (DRC) since 2009 acquiring knowledge of NCCD, McMansion, LHD design standards, and zoning codes that served him well when speaking before boards, commissions and city council on behalf of Hyde Park Neighborhood Association. During his tenure as president of the Hyde Park NA from 2008-2010 he initiated and sponsored the Hyde Park Local Historic District (LHD) the largest historic district in the city of Austin, served as HPNA ANC Representative and filed a lawsuit against the city of Austin that ultimately changed Historic Landmark Commission policies. He is considered one of the best presidents that Hyde Park ever had (and is recognized by longtime neighborhood advocate Dorothy Richter as the "Mayor" of Hyde Park). David is the Past Vice- Chair of the Hyde Park Contact Team.

David assisted North Loop property owners related to stealth dorm and small lot amnesty issues. As member and Chair of the Hyde Park CODENEXT Committee he has been monitoring the re-write of the Land Development Code. In the past year David has served as ANC Sector 5 Representative.

Sector 6 Representative Daniel Llanes

Daniel is a longtime Austin activist whose goal and focus is networking, communications and ensuring that ANC members are informed about the issues and are given the opportunity to participate with and have access to our elected officials and bureaucracy. To that end he has organized the East Austin ANC Sectors. Daniel experience includes: Member, Old West Austin Neighborhood Association (1980 to 1996); Neighborhood Representative to the Austin Plan, City of Austin Comprehensive planning process (1985 to 1987); Chair, Austin Peace Justice Coalition (1987 to 1992); Austin Activist of the Year 1991 (given by

NOKOA, the Observer); Board member, PODER – 2000 to 2009; First recipient of Cesar Chavez “Si Se Puede” Award (given by PODER); Chair, River Bluff Neighborhood Association (1997 to present); Keepers of Roy Guerrero Colorado River Park & Oak Springs Preserve (2003 to present); Coordinator, Govalle/Johnston Terrace Neighborhood Contact Team (2000 to present); Coordinator, Review Committee, Govalle/Johnston Terrace Neighborhood Contact Team – 2003 to present; Southwest Key Programs Community Empowerment Initiative - 2007 to 2013; Coordinator, East Austin Leadership Development Program; Coordinator, East Austin Voter Mobilization Initiative – 2008 to 2013.

Sector 7 Representative Patty Sprinkle

Neighborhood advocate and longtime resident of South Austin, Patty has been an active member of the Galindo Elementary Neighborhood Association holding the positions of President, Vice President, SCC Representative and ANC Representative. In her tenure as president, she guided the successful negotiations with the developer of a large tract owned by the Salvation Army, now the Denizen, creating a more thoughtful neighborhood friendly development. Patty is concerned with the continuing creep of downtown commercialization, burdening existing residential neighborhoods. The excess traffic, noise, trash, light pollution and unsafe pedestrian conditions degrade the quality of life for all residents. As Sector 7 Representative, she will provide resources and support for the neighborhoods she serves and will promote and uphold the values of the Austin Neighborhoods Council.

Sector 8 Representative Wayne Shipley

Wayne Shipley has been an Austin resident since 1980 and is s a founding member of the Neighborhood Association of Becket Ranch at Southern Oaks and Save Our Neighborhood.

He became a " neighborhood activist " when he saw that the South Austin Combined Neighborhood Plan (SACNP) was attempting to destroy everything about the Southern Oaks Neighborhood which he loves. He feels strongly that our neighborhood associations are under assault by among others, the City of Austin and groups presenting a "new urbanist" philosophy. This has presented itself in n many ways but the biggest thing right now is CodeNext. CodeNext is at best an attempt to stack the deck against current Neighborhood Associations and limit their ability to influence what happens in their own areas. At worst, it would change the face of Austin at every level.

Wayne’s goal in working with ANC is to fight with everything he has for protecting our neighborhoods. They are the main building blocks to a livable and prosperous Austin. The first step in so doing is to protect our NA's. He believes he can bring a unique perspective to

the table in that he and his neighbors in South Austin have recently gone through the neighborhood planning process. He feels like this gives us a unique insight into the way that CodeNext has been presented to us.

He has been the Sector 8 Representative for ANC the past two years. During this time, he has served on several committees including Strategic Initiatives, By-laws, Program and CodeNext.
